Next Commission Meeting – August 23, 2023 (NMAA)

NMAA Commission Meeting

February 1, 2023 9:00 AM Hall of Pride and Honor

Welcome – The meeting was called to order by Mr. Scott Affentranger at 9:01 am. A roll call was conducted by Ms. Alissa Wesbrook, NMAA Assistant to the Executive Director, and the following members were present:

15 members were present representing a quorum.

Not Present: Mr. Adrian Pete (Jr. High/Middle School Committee)

Approval of Agenda:

Mr. Affentranger asked for a motion to approve the agenda as presented. Ms. Stewart made a motion to approve the agenda with the removal of the discussion item - Academic Competition as Sanctioned Activity. Mr. Tensay seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (15-0).

Approval of Minutes:

Mr. Affentranger asked for a motion to approve the minutes of the November 16, 2022, Commission Meeting as presented. Mr. Henderson made a motion to approve the minutes. Mr. Roybal seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (15-0).

Elections:

Election of Commission Chairperson - Mr. Affentranger asked for nominations for Chair of the NMAA Commission. Mr. Mabrey nominated Mr. Affentranger and Mr. Henderson seconded. Mr. Roybal nominated Ms. Robinson who declined to serve in this role. Ms. Robinson nominated Mr. Roybal who also declined. Mr. Mirabal nominated Mr. Allison and Mr. Roybal seconded. Ms. Moores nominated Mr. Tensay and Mr. Martinez seconded. Mr. Affentranger removed his name from consideration. A roll call vote was taken between Mr. Allison and Mr. Tensay. Mr. Allison was elected Commission Chair with an 11-4 vote.

NMAA Director's Report:

Mr. Dusty Young, NMAA Associate Director, discussed five (5) items on his report: 1) welcomed to the Commission Mr. Allison from Springer Schools - representing Small Area A, Ms. Montoya from

the West Las Vegas Board of Education - representing the NM School Boards Association, Ms. Nougues from Gadsden Schools - representing Large Area C, and stated Mr. Mirabal of Magdalena Schools was reelected to represent Small Area C; 2) reported on the upcoming Winter Championships of Wrestling, Swimming & Diving, Basketball, and Spirit; 3) provided information regarding the NMAA Foundation's 2021-2022 Annual Report; 4) stated that the NMAA Foundation's scholarship program will see over 40 scholarships awarded later in February; and 5) reported that the NMAA Foundation's annual fundraising events will take place in April (Bowl-A-Thon) and June (Golf Classic).

NMAA Financial Report:

Ms. Shari Kessler-Schwaner, NMAA Business Manager, presented the financial report. She discussed two (2) items on her report: 1) reported on ticket sales for each Fall Championship; and 2) provided full financial reports for the Fall Championship Season.

NMAA Activities Report:

Ms. Tammy Richards, NMAA Assistant Director, presented the activities report. She discussed three (3) items on her report: 1) reported that State Bowling will take place this week for both small and large schools; 2) stated that all other state activity events will take place throughout the next three months; 3) acknowledged Ms. Hahn for the national recognition she has received for her service to Student Council; and 4) provided information regarding the NMADA hosting sectional NIAAA meetings during the upcoming State Basketball Championships.

New Mexico Officials Association Report:

Mr. Zac Stevenson, NMAA Commissioner of Officials, presented the officials report. He discussed seven (7) items on his report: 1) stated that 75 officials will represent the NMOA at the upcoming State Basketball, Swimming & Diving, and Wrestling Championships; 2) provided an update on the recruitment efforts of the NMOA; 3) reported on the statewide officiating curriculum that has been created as an elective course for high school students across the state; 4) recapped a national officials consortium that was recently hosted by the NFHS; 5) stated that continuing education is still a priority for the NMOA with events like the spring football officials forum and other clinics taking place during the offseason; 6) provided an update on the plans to increase opportunities during the NMOA's annual summer State Clinic; and 7) reported on current officials' numbers for spring sports. Mr. Allison asked for information regarding basketball officials' numbers – Mr. Stevenson stated that numbers are up, but availability is an issue that can lead to coverage issues, especially at the subvarsity and middle school levels.

General Discussion/Information Items:

July Awards Banquet - Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Executive Director, provided information on the NMAA Hall of Fame Banquet being adjusted so that honorees could be recognized in conjunction with NMOA and NMHSCA Hall of Famers during a special summer awards banquet to be held annually in July. Other NMAA, NMOA, NMHSCA, and NMADA awards will be distributed during this banquet, which will help to bring each of these organizations together as a more collaborative summer event is planned for the future.

Classification & Alignment - Ms. Marquez provided information on classification and alignment for the next two-year block. She stated the NMAA Board has asked the staff to look at new ways to classify schools, outside of using only enrollment numbers. Two of these possibilities include success/non-success factors and socio-economic factors. Ms. Marquez stated she will send out a survey to schools in relation to classification and alignment later in February. The NMAA Bylaws Committee will review data/ideas collected by staff and this information will be relayed to both the NMAA Commission & Board.

Sportsmanship / Compete with Class - Ms. Marguez discussed the current NMAA unsportsmanlike conduct bylaws in comparison to the Oklahoma and Louisiana policies. Through discussion the NMAA has come up with the following possibilities for bylaw changes in this area moving forward: Suspension for Athletic Activities for Unsporting Conduct would include: 1. Any time an egregious act of unsportsmanlike conduct by a team participant, including a coach, occurs two or more times during the same season, at the same school, in the same activity, the team will be suspended from participation in that activity for the remainder of the season. 2. Any time an egregious act of unsportsmanlike conduct by a non-team participant occurs two or more times during the same season, at the same school, in the same activity, the non-team member, along with all school spectators will be suspended from attendance in that activity for the remainder of the season. 3. Unsportsmanlike conduct is defined in the NMAA Handbook as non-compliance with sport specific rules and NMAA policies, including behaviors incompatible with "Compete with Class" and the interscholastic educational objective. Examples of egregious unsportsmanlike conduct by participants, coaches, or spectators include but are not limited to, fans entering the playing surface to engage in acts of violence or abuse, constant verbal attacks on officials, attacking other fans, coaches physically or verbally attacking officials, players fighting other players during post game handshakes, or student sections verbally chanting inappropriate or demeaning comments towards individuals, teams, or officials. 4. In the event the second act of misconduct occurs when there are no contests left in the current season, the penalty may be applied to the next season in the same activity. The NMAA will notify the school that the team and/or individual/spectators has been placed on warning after the first offense. Although feedback was mostly positive, it was felt that egregious unsportsmanlike conduct should be better/more defined should the membership decide to adopt this new policy.

Appeals / Hardships - Ms. Marquez provided information regarding the current process for hardship petitions and appeals and possible updates moving forward. The NMAA is exploring the use of a mediator during the appeals process – the mediator could possibly be a retired judge as this practice is used in other states around the country. Feedback was positive, but also included a recommendation that both the sending and receiving schools be represented during hardship and/or appeal hearings.

Eligibility: Amateurism / NIL- Ms. Marquez discussed the need for adjustments to NMAA bylaws pertaining to amateurism. This is due to changes at the NCAA level with regards to NIL and payments to athletes. The group discussed the difference between school programs receiving funding from businesses/sponsors as opposed to direct payments made to athletes.

Baseball: State Tournament Venues – Ms. Marquez and Mr. Young reported that the NMAA has been looking at alternative venues for the State Baseball Championships due to facility conflicts with both Isotopes Park and the University of New Mexico. They stated that the Albuquerque Regional Sports Complex would be an ideal location for the event with its five baseball fields, but policies prohibiting the use of metal cleats have been a road block in using that facility in previous years. Ms. Marquez stated that the city of Albuquerque has verbally approved the use of metal spikes for the 2023 tournament, so the NMAA hopes to finalize details soon that will move the majority of the tournament to the baseball complex located in west Albuquerque.

Football: State Playoff Sites - Mr. Young provided an update on information that has been collected regarding sites for the State Football Championships. He stated that a survey was sent to football coaches and athletic directors with this data being reviewed by the football sports specific committee. The current recommendation from this committee is to leave past history bylaws as is but look to implement some sort of facility guidelines/standards that must be met for a school to host a football playoff game.

Football: NFHS Equipment Discussions - Mr. Young reported on several football equipment items that were discussed at the recent NFHS Football Rules Committee meeting. He stated that the legality of after-market products added to football helmets will be reviewed by helmet manufacturers and NOCSAE. He also reported that in light of the incident that occurred with Damar Hamlin of the Buffalo Bills, shoulder pads may be looked at as equipment needing NOCSAE certification in the future. This NFHS SMAC did also state that this incident should remind sports organizations across the country as to how important it is to have EAPs in place for athletic contests.

Action Items:

Eligibility: Specialized Sports Training / Academies - Ms. Marquez presented a proposal regarding Specialized Sports Training. Bylaw 6.9.2.C Specialized Sports Training shall read: students and/or transfer students who enroll in an NMAA-member school after attending a specialized sport training academy or school, shall be ineligible for varsity participation in that sport(s) for 180 school / 365 calendar days from the date of their enrollment. Specialization sport training programs include, without limitation, non-school sponsored sports training academies or facilities that recruit participants for specialized training. Specialization sport training programs also include non-NFHS member prep school, non-scholastic team/program, or municipal sports teams. Mr. Allison asked for a motion to approve the proposal as presented. Mr. Mabrey made the motion to approve the proposal. Mr. Tensay seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (15-0).

Consider Adjournment

Mr. Allison asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting at 11:16 a.m. Mr. Tensay made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Ms. Stewart seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (15-0).

NMAA State Football Playoffs – Host Site Guidelines



MEMBER SCHOOL SELF-AUDIT – FOOTBALL PLAYOFF HOST SITE GUIDELINES

Purpose - The purpose of this instrument is to provide the NMAA member school athletic director with a tool to assess if their football facility is conducive to hosting a state tournament level contest. Careful attention to this assessment will help ensure a positive experience for coaches, student-athletes, spectators, officials, event staff, media, and any others that may be involved.

Procedure - The NMAA member school athletic director is required to complete and submit this form no later than September 1st of each school year. Checked boxes are interpreted as an acknowledgement that the guidelines listed can be met either in the facility's current state or with temporary* improvements.

*NOTE - Temporary improvements should be communicated to both the host school's opponent and the NMAA to ensure specific needs are met.

- Adequate Spectator Facilities Sufficent number of seats available, quality of seating, view from seating areas, restrooms, concessions, and crowd control (i.e., separation of spectators from field, spectator safety)
- Adequate Locker Rooms Sufficient space, location, and access to utilities (showers, heating/cooling, restrooms, etc.)
- Adequate Field Conditions Field (turf or grass) will not take away from game play (provided weather does not cause abnormal conditions)
- Adequate Press Box Area Sufficient access for coaches, media, and other event staff.
- Other Adequate Infrastructure Scoreboard, internet for potential video streaming, and sufficient parking.

Failure to meet the above guidelines will result in forfeiture of a school's ability to host a state football playoff contest. If a school is unable to host, the NMAA will work with the administration to determine an alternate site.

If this form is submitted but it is later determined that a facility did not meet the established guidelines for a state tournament game that was played, the host school may be subject to sanctions as determined by the NMAA Board of Directors. This may include, but is not limited to, forfeiture of playoff revenue share and/or eligibility to host future state football tournament contests.



NMAA Football Summer Activity

Possible verbiage:

If approved by school/district administration, helmets and/or pads are permitted for a period of no more than two consecutive weeks (Monday-Saturday) between the end of the spring sports season and July 15th. If a school opts to conduct summer workouts in this capacity, the following regulations must be followed:

Week 1 – The first two days of practice should be in shorts and helmets (no pads). During days three and four players should be in shorts, shoulder pads, and helmets ("shells"). Full pads can then be worn during days five and six – during this time full contact is allowed but should be limited to no more than 20 minutes per player on each day.

Week 2 – Full contact is allowed for a total of no more than 90 minutes per player for the week. Also, on a single day, full contact should be limited to no more than 30 minutes per player. In addition, schools could utlize this second week as an opportunity for students to attend a full padded camp if approved by local administration.

Note – As is the case with all sports, football workouts/camps held during the summer cannot be mandatory for student-athletes.



NMAA Definition of Hardship

The Hardship Review Committee will review eligibility cases which include extraordinary, medical, financial, or other circumstances that occur or are initiated within the immediate household of the student being petitioned and are deemed to have contributed to non-compliance with specific eligibility rules.

Extraordinary Circumstances Cases meeting <u>all</u> the following circumstances may result in the hardship committee decision to allow eligibility.

- A. Are unforeseeable, unavoidable, and uncorrectable on the part of the student and immediate household.
- **B.** Are not the direct result of actions by the student, with due consideration given to the age of the student and the nature of the circumstances resulting in non-compliance.
- C. Bear a direct, causal relationship to the hardship and the student's inability to meet the specific eligibility criteria.
- **D.** Are unique to the student and immediate household.

Hardship cases related to bullying, harassment and hazing shall be considered an extraordinary circumstance and the following additional guidance shall be considered by the hardship committee.

- The Safe Schools for All Students Act (NMAC 6.12.7) requires schools to implement policies and procedures for the prevention and reporting of bullying. Instances of bullying should be reported following each school's reporting procedures.
- 2. Bullying means any severe, pervasive, or persistent act or conduct that targets a student, whether physically, electronically, or verbally, and that may be based on a student's actual or perceived race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, sex, sexual orientation, gender identify, spousal affiliation, physical or cognitive disability or any other distinguishing characteristic; or an association with a person, or group with any person, with one or more of the actual or perceived distinguishing characteristics; and can be reasonably predicted to:
 - **a.** place a student in reasonable fear of physical harm to the student's person or property;
 - b. cause a substantial detrimental effect on a student's physical or mental health;
 - c. substantially interfere with a student's academic performance, attendance, or participation in extracurricular activities; and/or
 - **d.** substantially interfere with a student's ability to participate in or benefit from the services, activities, or privileges provided by a school or school affiliated entity.

Note: Extraordinary circumstances are not applicable where it is proven that the move was athletically motivated or there was undue influence on the part of the receiving school.

Medical

- A. A long-confining illness, injury or death which impacts the student and his/her immediate family, and results in:
 - 1. A change of the residence or the school attendance of the student's immediate household, or
 - 2. The significant interruption of the student's normal progression toward graduation.
- **B.** Illness, injury, or other circumstances of a similar nature must be verified in writing by a licensed health professional.

Financial

- A. Changes in financial condition which are permanent (minimally for the duration of the student's high school attendance), substantial and significantly beyond the control of the student or the student's immediate household. Minimally the change in financial condition must reflect a 25% decrease in household cash flow on the "Change in Family Financial Condition" form.
- **B.** The following documentation, verifying the financial circumstances, MUST be submitted with the petition. Failure to provide adequate documentation will result in denial of the petition.
 - 1. Statement of "Changes in Family Financial Condition" (attached form)
 - 2. Documentation supporting household expenses as per the form, are as follows:
 - i. <u>Income:</u>Current pay stub; most recent W-2; most recent Form 1040; current employment contract; annual interest/dividend statements. Submit all that apply
 - ii. <u>Expenses:</u> Most recent bill/statement; expense contract; other supporting documentation as available.

Note: Financial documentation provided by the petitioner, except for the "Changes" form, will be distributed to the committee just prior to the hardship hearing. The NMAA office will retain one copy in the petition file and all additional copies will be destroyed to maintain the financial privacy of the petitioner.

TRANSFER RULE HARDSHIP PETITION

<u>PURPOSE OF FORM</u>: This form is used <u>only</u> to request a WAIVER OF THE TRANSFER RULE (i.e., student enrolls and attends one or more classes then changes enrollment to/from one school to another school) based upon hardship circumstances.

APPLICABLE NMAA BYLAWS:

<u>Rule 6.6 Transfer</u>: A transfer Student is a Student who chooses to attend a high school outside his/her designated attendance zone or who resides with someone other than Parent(s) after his/her initial open enrollment choice, or returns to his/her home district school after an open enrollment choice. Student is ineligible for varsity competition for 180 school days/365 calendar days.

<u>Rule 6.9.2 A.9. Hardship:</u> In individual cases, the NMAA Hardship Review Committee may, at its discretion and upon such terms and conditions as it may impose, waive or modify the Transfer Rules (Section VI) when, in its opinion, enforcement of the rule would create an undue hardship upon the student.

*NOTE: This form, and all required documentation, must be received in the NMAA Office **no later than 1 week prior** to the NMAA Hardship Review Committee meeting date.

Complete and mail all sections of this form, along with all additional documentation with Form A, Form C, and a copy of the transcripts to the NMAA office. Rulings on hardship eligibility requests will be communicated by phone within 24 hours of hearing.

The receiving school is responsible for originating and processing Form A, Form C, and the school transcript, along with the Transfer Rule Hardship Petition, as well as obtaining Verification of Reason for Transfer from the sending school (see Section I).

HARDSHIP PETITION INFORMATION

To be completed by RECEIVING SCHOOL

Submit the following required documentation with this form, **no later than 1 week prior** to the Hardship Review Committee meeting date:

- 1. Forms A and C, and the school transcripts.
- 2. Current class schedule (student must be enrolled and attending classes).
- <u>Hardship</u> Documentation that establishes hardship, including, but not limited to medical documentation, court documents, income tax returns, current earnings statement, list of monthly expenditures, financial information, etc. All documentation to be considered for establishment of hardship must be provided at the time of the initial petition. Additional documentation after ruling will not be accepted.
- 4. Section I to be completed by sending school and mailed back to receiving school to be part of this application.
- 5. Section II to be completed by parents or guardians and student.

Proposal: Update "Crowd Control" bylaw to include specific penalties for egregious acts of unsportsmanlike conduct.

7.7.4 Crowd Control & Unsportsmanlike Conduct

A school is responsible for the conduct of its team, coaches, students, and fans at any interscholastic event in which the school is participating. The basic responsibility for crowd control lies with the host administration who are required to provide an administrator or administrator's designee to be in attendance. It is also recommended that the visiting school provide an administrator or administrator's designee for any potentially contentious contests. In both situations, the administrator and/or administrator's designee cannot be a coach participating in the event. The Executive Director may invoke penalties upon a member school for actions, which violate the principles of "Compete with Class." These actions include, but are not limited to, hindering the normal progress of an event, creating situations that may lead to the restriction or discontinuance of interscholastic competition, or endangering or threatening the personal safety of any individuals involved. Unsportsmanlike conduct by coaches, students, and/or spectators may cause the school or individual to be placed on probation or suspension for 180 school days/365 calendar days (See also 7.6.23).

A. Team/Fan Suspension from Athletic Activities for Unsportsmanlike Conduct

- 1. <u>Any time an egregious act of unsportsmanlike conduct by a team participant, including a coach, occurs two or more times during the same season, at the same school, in the same activity, the team will be suspended from participation in that activity for the remainder of the season.</u>
- 2. <u>Any time an egregious act of unsportsmanlike conduct by a non-team participant occurs two or</u> more times during the same season, at the same school, in the same activity, all school spectators will be suspended from attendance in that activity for the remainder of the season.
- 3. Unsportsmanlike conduct is defined in the NMAA Handbook as non-compliance with sport specific rules and NMAA policies, including behaviors incompatible with "Compete with Class" and the interscholastic educational objective. Examples of egregious unsportsmanlike conduct by participants, coaches, or spectators include but are not limited to, fans entering the playing surface to engage in acts of violence or abuse, constant verbal attacks on officials, attacking other fans, coaches physically or verbally attacking officials, players fighting other players during post game handshakes, or student sections verbally chanting inappropriate or demeaning comments towards individuals, teams, or officials.
- 4. In the event the second act of misconduct occurs when there are no contests left in the current season, the penalty may be applied to the next season in the same activity. The NMAA will notify the school that the team and/or individual/spectators has been placed on warning after the first offense.
- **Rationale:** More concrete and stringent penalties are necessary to deter egregious acts of unsportsmanlike conduct and better ensure the principles of interscholastic activity and "Compete with Class" are not overshadowed by poor behavior.

Proposal: Update "Amateurism" bylaws to provide clarity on when amateur status is lost and the means in which student-athletes can utilize their name, image and likeness.

6.18.3 Reimbursement or Financial Benefit – CURRENT

An amateur athlete shall not receive (directly or indirectly) reimbursement or financial benefit as a result of their athletic performance or abilities. Financial benefit includes cash, stipends, compensation, endorsements, boarding/living expenses, free or reduced meals, merchandise, gift certificates, etc.

6.18.3 Loss of Amateur Status – PROPOSED

An amateur athlete forfeits amateur status in a sport by:

- A. Competing for money or other monetary compensation
- B. Receiving any award or prize of monetary value
- C. Capitalizing on athletic fame by receiving money or gifts of monetary value in affiliation or connection with activities involving the student's school team or school.
 - 1. This provision is not intended to restrict the right of any student to participate in a commercial endorsement provided there is no school team, school, or NMAA affiliation.
 - 2. The student is prohibited from appearing in the uniform of the student's school and may not utilize the marks, logos, etc. of the school, or NMAA as part of any endorsement.
- *NOTE: This provision is also applicable to participants in the activity of Esports.

Rationale: Due to the increasing prevalence of social media influence and the ability to monetize that presence and influence, it is necessary to clarify the ways in which students can utilize their name, image and likeness while still retaining their amateur status.

7.7.9 Video Recording/Telecasts/Radio Broadcasting Consent Rule/Procedures

D. Telescopic Camera Poles – Telescopic camera poles shall be manned at all times and shall only be utilized by approved media or school personnel. Telescopic camera poles shall not be permitted on the players' sideline or inside the spectator seating area.

Rationale: Necessary to create telescopic pole regulations due to their increased prevalence at sporting events.
