> Item 1 – Bylaw 6.1.2 Transferring to Follow a Coach

Add the following wording to the current NMAA Bylaw 6.1.2, Transferring to Follow a Coach: This bylaw takes effect once a student enters the 7<sup>th</sup> grade.

Item 2 – Bylaw 6.1.3 Undue Influence of a Student

Expand on communication segment of Bylaw 6.1.3, Undue Influence of a Student with the following excerpts:

- Any student, family or individual that contacts a coach about attending a school where he or she coaches must be informed that they need to contact the principal, admissions department or guidance department if they have an interest in transferring.
- 2. Any meeting with coaches regarding prospective athletes and their families must be at the request of the family, to the individual(s) responsible for admissions and must take place at the school.

#### Item 3 – Bylaw 6.2.6 Grace Period

The legal guardianship must have been established at least one calendar year before the transfer.

#### Proposal:

Pojoaque requests that it be moved to district 2AAA for the 2012-2013, 2013-2014 school years.


#### **Rationale:**

The rationale for this request fall into the following categories:

• <u>Disproportionality of Private School Championships</u> - Based on direct comparison of expected and observed championships from the 2006-2007 school year through the 2010-2011 school year, there is solid statistical evidence that there is a relationship between private (non-attendance zone) school status and the likelihood of winning a championship. While the NMAA grapples with this issue, we believe that it is inequitable for a single school, Pojoaque Valley High School (PVHS), in the NMAA system to be placed in a district with only private (non-attendance zone schools). PVHS requests the same heterogenous makeup of district that is experienced by all other NMAA schools. The chart below reflects the fact that between school year 2006-2007 and 2010-2011, out of 277 total championships, private schools would be expected to have won 45, when in fact, they won 92 championships.

#### **Private School NMAA Championships 2006-2011**





- Revenues As predicted in the June, 2009 letter from District 2AAA athletic directors to Mr. Gary Trip, PVHS has experienced significant degreases in revenue as a result of decreased district revenue. The attachment, *District Tournament Revenue Comparison*, demonstrates a decrease of nearly \$20,000 in average annual revenue from District Tournaments in comparing District 2AAA to 5AAA. This equates to over a 50% decrease. Without breaking down all revenue from athletic competitions, a proportional decrease can easily be extrapolated into district game gate revenue and concession revenue. This extrapolation would easily equate to tens-of-thousands of dollars in losses to Pojoaque High School's athletic programs. \*Reference Attachment: *District Tournament Revenue Comparison*
- <u>Historical Rivalries in Previous District</u> I have received countless complaints in northern New Mexico about the loss of traditional rivalries when District 2AAA changed. These rivalries and the significance of games as implications on a District championship have driven spectator interest for over 40 years. The loss of these rivalries in northern New Mexico have been very real.
- <u>Support from St. Michaels to join 2AAA</u> We have received confirmation from St. Michaels High School Athletic Director, Mr. Tom Manning, that St. Michaels supports a reconstitution of District 2AAA as it existed, prior to 2010.
- Why now? Every season that we are forced to play in District 5AAA, we will be losing significant revenue. This loss in revenue has begun to have an effect on the quality of programs that are offered at PVHS. The process to deal with disparity between public and private schools may be very complicated and may take a long time to be resolved. We believe that PVHS should not have to wait-out the process before that very extreme condition of a single public school isolated with nothing but non-attendance zone schools is remedied.
- Other Considerations 6 School Districts is better for scheduling and revenue, likelihood of Santa Fe Indian School requesting independent status in football, and PVHS has always believed that they should be in 2AAA and never wanted to move.

#### **Budget Impact:**

The district has documented thousands of dollars in lost revenue and is projecting tens-of-thousands more, based on projections that regular season gates and concession sales will be proportional to district tournament revenues. The chart below reflects the decrease in average District tournament revenue between the years that PVHS was in District 2AAA and the years that PVHS was in District 5AAA.

Draft Summary Comparison of 2006-2011 Public/Private NMAA Athletic Championships

Comparison of 2006-2011 Public/Private School Athletic Championships in NMAA Schools

#### **Research Design**

#### Sample

The New Mexico Activities Association has compiled a data summary (*Public/Private*, n.d.) of public and private school member schools and athletic championship competitions. These data summarize the participation of 168 member schools and 277 championship competitions between the 2006-2007 and the 2010-2011 school years. The 277 championship competitions were the outcomes of individual school seasons for individual sports. The data are presented as frequencies (totals) of boolean categorical classifications of public/private status and champion/no-champion status.

#### Measures

The dependent variable was the championship status of each school's athletic season in individual sports (CHAMPIONSHIP). Each season resulted in a championship, or not. The independent variable used in this study was the status of a school as a public school (Status). Each school is classified as a public school or not.

#### **Analyses Performed**

The fact that the NMAA's data was already summarized, simplified the statistical analysis. For the first research question, I conducted contingency table analysis, using the determination that the data summary comprised an entire population. For the investigated period of time, the data summary included every championship competition under the purview of the NMAA. For the second research question, a chi square goodness of fit analysis was performed to test for

independence of the two categorical variables using public status as the independent or predictor variable and championship status as the dependent or outcome variable. The chi square goodness of fit test was conducted using a significance level of 5% ( $\alpha$ =0.05).

#### **Findings**

#### **Research Question 1**

My first research question asks if there is a relationship between public status and championship status based on a population model. The analysis tests the null hypothesis that there is no relationship between the public status of a school and the outcome of that school's success in pursuit of a championship. Table 1 represents the contingency table used for analysis of the data as a population. If the data are treated as population/census data, then a simple comparison of expected and observed outcomes yields a determination relative to the null hypothesis of no relationship; if expected and observed percentages are unequal then the null hypothesis is rejected. As can be seen in the contingency table represented in Table 1, the observed percentage of championships is dramatically different than the expected percentage of championships for each category. The expected number of championships was determined from the percentage of member schools that are public and conversely the percentage that are private. Of 167 NMAA member schools, 141 are public (83.92%); 27 (16.07%) are private. Based on these frequencies, I expected 232 (83.92%) championships from public schools while only 185 (66.79%) were observed. I reject the null hypothesis in the population of NMAA championships between 2006 and 2011. A private school is actually 47% more likely to win a championship than would be expected from membership data.

#### **Research Question 2**

Our second research question asks if there is a relationship between public status and championship status based on a sample model. The analysis tests the null hypothesis that there is no relationship between the public status of a school and the outcome of that school's success in pursuit of a championship. Table 2 represents the contingency table used for analysis of the data as a population. I used a chi square goodness of fit model to determine the likelihood that there is a relationship between public status and championship status. For the chi square goodness of fit test, I used a significance level of 0.05. Based on a significance level of 0.05 ( $\alpha$ =0.05) and a single degree of freedom (df = k-1 = 2 - 1 = 1), the critical value of  $\chi^2$  from a standard table is 7.879. The value of  $\chi^2$  for the dataset can be observed from Table 2,  $\chi^2 = \Sigma(O-E)^2/E = 60.3416$ . Since  $\chi^2$  (60.3416) is greater than the critical value of  $\chi^2$  for the 5% significance level (7.879), I reject the null hypothesis in the population of NMAA championships between 2006 and 2011; there is a negative relationship between public school status and championships in the data. This

test indicates that there is less than a 5% chance that the difference between expected and observed frequencies are due to sampling error.

#### Conclusion

This study has used five years worth of data to determine that, for the 168 member schools in the NMAA, there is a relationship between the status of a school as public or private and the frequencies of championships for those schools. Based on these analyses, knowing the public or private status of a school at the beginning of an athletic season will indicate the likelihood of that school to earn a state championship at the conclusion of the season.

#### **Application of Findings**

The NMAA is currently engaged in the study of public/private issues, in an effort to determine whether or not a change needs to be made in the way that schools are classified. In my estimation, the results of this study provide a definite answer to the question of whether or

not there is independence between the public/private status of a school and the likelihood of attaining a championship in a given season. This conclusion is added to the strong public school advocacy for a change to the system, based primarily on anecdotal evidence and conjecture.

The determination of what to actually do, is significantly more challenging. Some states have added multipliers to private school enrollments, while others have simply created separate championship systems for private schools. The myriad of issues that potentially contribute to disparity are often difficult to quantify and it is even harder determine individual contributions to disparity.

#### **Shortcomings of Study**

The data used in this study was summarized and disaggregated. This summarization left several questions. First, since the data was compiled, the NMAA has determined that an important distinction is the difference between private schools and non-attendance zone schools. At the time that the data was compiled, it was common to refer to schools as either private or public. It was later clarified that some of the schools that were being called "private" were actually publicly funded schools that happened not to have attendance zones, such as Bureau of Indian Education (BIE) schools. It is taken to be true, that the classification of private schools in the summarized data, included all non-attendance zone schools. Analysis of raw source data would eliminate any question about classification.

A single frequency of total NMAA membership and private school frequency was used for this analysis. This was done because the summarized data only included the frequencies for the 2010-2011 school year. It is true that there has been some fluctuation in total membership and

private school membership over the five-year period represented by the data. I conducted a simple algebraic calculation to determine that the average number of private schools would have to more than double from 27 to 56, in order for expected championships to equal the observed championships.

Mr. Tripp,

Please accept this letter as a request for the New Mexico Activities Association (NMAA) to reconsider Pojoaque High School's district placement within the NMAA system in the next round of classification.

I have attached a letter providing some rationale for this request, from Pojoaque High School's Athletic Director, Mr. Matt Martinez. In addition to the rationale provided by Mr. Martinez, I would like to add one item for consideration. In light of recent conversations regarding the perception of disparity between attendance-zone schools and non-attendance-zone schools, I believe that Pojoaque High School epitomizes a school with potential disparity. Pojoaque High School is currently the only attendance zone school in district 2AAA.

As the NMAA is in the process of considering the path forward in dealing with this issue of attendance zones, I feel that Pojoaque High School should be moved. I know that there is at least some evidence of disparity. In consideration of this evidence, I ask that the athletes of Pojoaque High School be given the same heterogenous district constitution as other districts in the state, relative to non-attendance and attendance zone schools.

My Athletic Director and I would be happy to meet with you and/or your staff on this issue. Please let us know how to proceed as soon as possible. Thank you for your consideration on this matter.



On June 3, 2009 I made an appeal to the NMAA Board of Directors to remain in District 2AAA. The appeal was denied. We were a member of District 2AAA since 1976 and were moved into District 5AAA at the NMAA Board of Directors meeting in March of 2009. We are the only public school in our current alignment and we have taken a positive attitude when we were placed in District 5AAA. I have seen a decrease in attendance for all district games in the new district.

While I feel that we are comfortable and competitive in District 5AAA, I strongly believe we belong in District 2AAA with Taos, West Las Vegas, Robertson and Raton where we have established rivalries in one of the best and oldest districts in the State. We depend on gate ticket sales to support all of our programs and District 2AAA has a strong northern base of fans who support all their teams. In the bad economic times that we are currently experiencing I felt it was a bad move to change the district alignment and place our school in District 5AAA. I understand that Santa Fe Indian School wants to move out of District 5AAA in Football and move into independent status. Their administration wrote a letter to the NMAA and wanted the current alignment indicating they would move into the district for Football if the alignment was approved.

I have attached the letter that I presented to the NMAA Board in 2009 as well as the letter from Santa Fe Indian School.

#### Dear Executive Director:

This letter is to inform you about the future status of District 2AAA as indicated in the alignment for 2010. Currently, District 2AAA is one of the oldest districts in the state, which is over 40 years old. All current district 2AAA schools wish to remain in District 2AAA. At our district meeting on April 30, 2009 all District 2AAA member schools voted and we want District 2AAA to remain the same with the addition of Taos. We feel there would be a large loss in revenue for our schools and we depend on football and basketball gate receipts to support all the other sports we have at our schools. Over the years District 2AAA has averaged over \$10,000 for the tournaments in Volleyball and Basketball. In 2005, \$12,107.77 was sent and in 2009, \$11,000.43 was sent to the NMAA. This does not include Football. This amount of funding would be greatly reduced with the new proposed alignment.

Traditional rivalries have been established over the years and the competition between our district schools is the best to be found in the State of New Mexico. In the new alignment only four teams would remain in District 2AAA and this would have an impact on our scheduling. Raton would have a difficult time finding teams to play. St. Michael's High School would be in more than one district with more expenditures and less revenue coming in. Pojoaque would be the only public school in a district with all the private schools.

West Las Vegas, Robertson, Raton, Taos, and St. Michaels are the original members of District 2AAA which originated in about 1965. Pojoaque came into the district in 1976 and Santa Fe Indian School moved into District 2AAA in 2000 plus. We have a strong northern base of fans that are very supportive in Volleyball, Football, and Basketball. In the economic hard times we are now experiencing it would be difficult to recover financially with the new purposed districts.
