NMAA Commission Meeting November 20, 2012 9:00 AM NMAA Office

Welcome – Meeting called to order by Mr. Lawrence Johnson, NMAA Commission Chairperson, at 9:04 a.m. A roll call was conducted by Mrs. Mindy Ioane, NMAA Administrative Assistant, and the following members were present.

Approval of Agenda:

Mr. Johnson asked for a motion to approve the agenda. Mr. Affentranger made a motion to approve the agenda. Mr. MacFarlane seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (14-0).

Approval of Minutes from September 12, 2012:

Mr. Johnson asked for a motion to approve the minutes of the September 12, 2012 Commission meeting as presented. Mr. Barreras made a motion to approve the minutes. Mr. Tillman seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (14-0).

Directors' Report:

Mr. Bill Cleland, NMAA Associate Director, discussed four items during his report: (1) winners in Commission voting were: Mr. Bruce Carver, Large Area A; Mr. Wayne Ferguson, Small Area B; and Mr. Greg Haston, Large Area B; (2) winners in Board voting were: Mr. Paul Benoit, Small Area B; Mr. T.J. Parks, Large Area B; and Mr. George Straface, Large Area C; (3) the 2012 Fall State Championships in the sports of

Cross Country, Soccer and Volleyball - attendance numbers were lower than last year but the action was exciting at all venues and the events themselves were successful; and (4) the CTSO Fall Leadership Conference, where 417 students participated, representing 54 member mid / high schools.

Mr. Dusty Young, NMAA Associate Director, discussed two items during his report: (1) former Executive Director Gary Tripp's reception that will be held on Thursday, November 29, 2012 at 6:00 p.m. at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Albuquerque; and 2) introduced two new staff members, Assistant Directors' Chris Kedge and Scott Owen.

Activities Report:

Mr. Joe Butler, NMAA Assistant Director, gave details of the 2012 One Act Play Competition that was held at San Juan College in Farmington, New Mexico. There were 331 participants from 16 member schools. Aztec High School won the Athens division and Lordsburg High School won the Sparta division.

NMOA Report:

Ms. Dana Pappas, NMAA Deputy Director, discussed the NMAA's webpage being down during part of the State Volleyball Championships. To ensure that individuals would have up-to-date State Championship information, traffic to the NMAA website was diverted to the NMAA Events Facebook page. As a result of that decision, the Facebook page is up to 1195 "likes" and she discussed the demographics of those who visited the site. Ms. Pappas spoke of the NW Region's continued struggle in getting enough officials to cover the region and she discussed the success of the Fall District Basketball Clinics held in various locations statewide.

General Action Items

Physical Fitness and Participant Insurance for JROTC, Bowling, and Rodeo: (Referendum Item) Mr. Dusty Young, NMAA Associate Director, presented a proposal to require JROTC, bowling, and rodeo participants to follow the same physical fitness and insurance regulations as required of athletes in Sections 6.15 and 6.16 of the NMAA Handbook. The rationale for the proposal is as follows: The activities of JROTC, bowling, and rodeo all require participants to physically exert themselves in competition. Because of this, students participating in these activities should go through the same physical examination process as those students that participate in sports. Additionally, participation in each of these activities can result in injury, and therefore students should be required to be covered by accident/injury insurance. Mr. Johnson asked about adding other activities such as band to the proposal. Mr. Barreras made a motion to Table the proposal until it has been presented to the Activities Council in January, 2013. Mr. Carver seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (14-0).

General Discussion/Information Items

Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Executive Director, asked that the first item, Status of Classification and Alignment, be made the final item of the General Discussion/Information Items.

Football seeding on Saturday night: Ms. Marquez discussed issues concerning football seeding on Saturday night. First, is that it takes place on the same night that the NMAA staff is wrapping up the State Soccer and Cross Country Championships. She explained that in addition to the timing of the seeding, this year two of the games were held the same night and staff had to wait for the results of those games. She also stated that MaxPreps was not updated with results of all Saturday contests, as well as the issue of film exchange no longer being necessary due to the use of the Huddle website by many schools. Commission members discussed the pros and cons of having the seeding meeting conducted on Sunday morning and would like to hear the Football Sports Specific committee recommendations.

Tie breakers in sports without district tournaments: Ms. Marquez discussed issues brought to her attention concerning the use of the tie-breaker rule in the sports of football and soccer. Discussion between the members was in agreement that they like the structure of the tie-breaker and would like to leave it as-is.

1st place playoff game (regular season basketball/volleyball): Ms. Marquez asked if the playoff game for the regular season championship should go to the tie-breaker rule instead of playing an extra game in the sports of basketball and volleyball. After some discussion, Commission members would like to recommend to the Board of Directors that the tie-breaker procedures be utilized to have consistency throughout all sports.

Move Fall sports up one week: Ms. Marquez discussed the prospect of moving the start date of cross country, soccer, and volleyball up one week, thereby allowing State Championships to be completed a week earlier. In addition to possibly helping with issues related to the time change and cold weather, this would also allow students participating in volleyball, cross country, and soccer to participate in Winter sports sooner than they can now. She asked for feedback and discussion on this item.

Alzheimer's Awareness (purple shoelaces): Ms. Marquez asked the members to support Alzheimer's Awareness by having basketball teams wear purple shoelaces during the week of November 26 through December 1, 2012.

Break 10:28 -10:38

Mr. Affentranger left the meeting during the break.

Status of Classification and Alignment: Ms. Marquez discussed the 3 proposals that will be presented to the Board of Directors on Thursday, November 29, 2012. The proposals were created based on survey results from the 2012 Annual Meeting, as well as input received from the membership and NMAA staff. Ms. Marquez emphasized that the proposals are data driven and that a fourth "information item" will also be presented, but it will not necessarily be a formal proposal. She discussed that this item, the "status quo", would not work in creating the upcoming block due to enrollment shifts at various schools. The proposals are as follows:

- 1. All schools divided into six equal classes.
- 2. Create classifications based on equal splits above and below 400 students. Schools with enrollment above 400 will be divided into 3 classes and schools with enrollment less than 400 students will then be divided into 3 classes.
- 3. Districts to consist ideally of 8 teams. Take the top 72 enrollment schools and split them evenly into 5A, 4A, and 3A (i.e. 24 in each class). All remaining schools are then split into 3 additional classes as evenly as possible.

All proposals will be presented with a multiplier and without a multiplier. The multiplier will be based on reported differences in participation rates between public and private schools. Discussion ensued as to whether or not the multiplier should only be applied to schools with enrollment above 150 students. Ms. Marquez requested feedback from the Commission prior to the November 29th Board of Directors meeting.

Mr. Gearhart left the meeting at 11:06 a.m.

Consider Adjournment:

Mr. Johnson asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting at 11:16 a.m. A motion was made by Mr. Barreras. Mr. MacFarlane seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (12-0).

7.17.3 Misconduct Progression Rule

B. Post Season

Upon the commencement of the first round of post-season, all player and coaches receive a "clean slate" for the accumulation of cards. However, any pending sit-out resulting from the accumulation of cards or a direct send-off must be fulfilled in post season (starting the quarterfinal round) if the requirement for a sit-out has not been met during the regular season or first round of the playoffs. For example, if a player receives his/her fifth yellow card or is sent off during the final regular season game, he/she will be required to sit out the first game of the post-season if the team has qualified for post-season competition. If the team earns a first round by he/she will be required to sit out the quarterfinal game. If the player receives his/her fifth yellow card or is sent off during the first round of the state playoffs, he/she will be required to sit out the quarterfinal round of the post season. The player will sit out the first game of the next season if the team has not qualified for post season competition.

- 1. If a player is ejected for "persisting in misconduct after receiving caution" (a "second yellow card" offense) he/she is charged with one caution in that contest. However, the player ejected is not permitted to participate in the following contest.
- 2. Any yellow cards received during the regular season, or first round of the playoffs. DO NOT carry over into the post-season. NOTE: If an athlete receives the 5th, 7th, 9th, etc. yellow card in the last game of the regular season, the athlete will still be required to sit out the first game in post season play. Athletes who receive a second yellow card in post-season play (beginning with the quarterfinal round) will be required to sit out the next game. Also, an athlete who receives a red card must sit out the next game minimally, no matter when it is received.
- 3. Coaches who are ejected must sit out the next contest minimally in post season as well as regular season play.

RE: Licensing Requirements Under the Bingo & Raffle Act

Dear Ms. Marquez:

We at the New Mexico Gaming Control Board (hereafter "Board") understand that there are many "educational organizations" throughout New Mexico that are associated with our public, private and charter schools that use bingo and raffles as a means to raise funds. However, it has also come to our attention that many of these organizations are unaware of the New Mexico Bingo & Raffle Act 60-2F-1, Sections 60-2F-1 through 60-2F-26 NMSA 1978, (hereafter "Act"). By raising such awareness, the Board is not attempting to prevent such activity, but merely seeking to ensure that educational organizations are in compliance with rather inexpensive and fairly simple licensing requirements.

Only "qualified organizations" can be licensed under the Act. Section 60-2F-4(Y) of the Act reads,

"Y. "qualified organization" means a bona fide chartered branch, lodge or chapter of a national or state organization or any bona fide religious, charitable, environmental, fraternal, educational or veterans' organization operating without profit to its members that has been in existence in New Mexico continuously for a period of two years immediately prior to conducting a raffle or making an application for a license under the New Mexico Bingo and Raffle Act and that has had a membership engaged in carrying out the objects of the corporation or organization. A voluntary firefighter's organization is a qualified organization and a labor organization is a qualified organization for the purposes of the New Mexico Bingo and Raffle Act if they use the proceeds from a game of chance solely for scholarship or charitable purposes;" (Emphasis added)

Additionally, Section 60-2F-4(I) of the Act reads,

"I. "educational organization" means an organization within the state, including recognized student organizations, not organized for pecuniary profit, whose primary purpose is educational in nature and designed to develop the capabilities of individuals by instruction;" (Emphasis added)

Based on the above, the Act gives the Board the authority to regulate qualified organizations (including "educational organizations" and "recognized student organizations"). For qualified organizations to be in compliance with the Act; school districts, schools, and recognized student organizations, must adhere to the following requirements:

1) A qualified organization must have "been in existence in New Mexico continuously for a period of two years immediately prior to conducting a raffle or making an application for a license." (See §60-2F-4(Y)).

2) A qualified organization must file quarterly reports, (See §60-2F-19(A)).

3) A qualified organization must maintain a separate bingo and raffle operating account, (See §60-2F-19(C)).

Additionally, school districts should be aware that the Act may exempt from our authority those qualified organizations that choose not to be licensed, but limit the number of gaming events they conduct. By way of example, Section 60-2F-26(A)(2) of the Act reads,

"60-2F-26. Exemptions.

A. Except as provided in Subsection B of this section, nothing in the New Mexico Bingo and Raffle Act shall be construed to apply to:

(2) a bingo or a raffle held by a qualified organization that holds no more than one bingo occasion or one raffle in any three consecutive calendar months and not exceeding four occasions in one calendar year."

Nonetheless, if a qualified organization is unlicensed, yet exceeds the permitted number of exemptions, I would offer the following advisory opinion as to how public schools, private schools and recognized student organizations may be violating the act and/or criminal code:

In the opinion of the Board, a public high school basketball team's booster club, varsity club, drill team or other sports team would be an educational organization under the Bingo & Raffle Act. However, if such organizations were to hold a raffle at every home game, including but not limited to a "50-50" raffle, they would exceed the exemption limit set forth in Section 60-2F-26 of the Act.

Therefore, if an educational organization is unlicensed and exceeds the maximum exemptions, the organization may be subjecting itself to criminal penalties. This letter is an attempt to help the State of New Mexico Public Schools and private schools from violating the law. For instance, the New Mexico Criminal Code requires any magistrate that receives a written affidavit of a suspected gambling activity from any citizen, to dispatch peace officers to investigate.

Even though the above example would be viewed by the Board as extreme, to alleviate any appearance of impropriety, the public schools, private schools and recognized student organizations should take certain measures to be in compliance with the Act and to avoid any potential violation of the criminal code. For instance, the following options would allow your school district, schools and/or recognized student organizations to comply with the Act:

- 1) A district or school decides to apply for a license and umbrellas ALL raffles/clubs under one license; or
- 2) A district or school decides to apply for a license and umbrellas some raffles/clubs, but not all; the remaining clubs can choose to get a license or may decide that they are exempt due to the frequency (less than 4 per year); or
- 3) A district or school decides NOT to apply for a license and decides to require each of its clubs to determine whether they need a license or can be exempt (due to (frequency of 4 or less per).

We very much appreciate your assistance in getting the word out to the many helpful educational organizations that strive to make our children's educational experience more complete.
