NMAA Commission Meeting February 22, 2012 9:00 AM NMAA Office

Welcome – Meeting called to order by Mr. Lawrence Johnson, NMAA Commission Chairperson, at 9:00 a.m. A roll call was conducted by Ms. Jacquelyne Gallegos, NMAA Administrative Assistant, and the following members were present.

Approval of Agenda:

Mr. Johnson asked for a motion to approve the agenda. Mr. Martin made a motion to approve the agenda. Mr. Barreras seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (15-0).

Approval of Minutes from November 16, 2011:

Mr. Johnson asked for a motion to approve the minutes from the November 16, 2011 Commission meeting as presented. Mr. Stacy made a motion to approve the minutes. Mr. Gerheart seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (15-0).

Election of Vice Chairperson:

Thomas Mabrey made a motion to accept Mr. Terry Martin as the vice chairperson of the Commission. Scott Affentranger seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (15-0). Terry Martin is the new vice chairperson.

Directors' Report:

Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, discussed four items on her report. (1) Life of An Athlete: Mr. Robert Zayas is conducting code of conduct seminars in Santa Fe, Roswell and Las Cruces this week; (2) Mr. Gary Tripp is currently working

with the scholarship committee selecting the 2012 scholarship recipients; (3) the swimming and diving and wrestling state championships were held on Feb. 17-18, 2012; and (4) state basketball tournament pass sales are about even right now with what was sold last year.

Financial Report:

Mrs. Shari Kessler-Schwaner, NMAA Business Manager, presented the Fall sports revenue and expense reports.

Activities Report:

Ms. Kristin Derr, NMAA Assistant Director, discussed three items during her report. (1) The student council Spring conference; (2) the BPA and DECA State championships that were held Feb. 17-18, 2012; and (3) the upcoming Spring Activities State Championships.

NMOA Report:

Ms. Dana Sanchez, Commissioner of Officials, discussed three items during her report.

- (1) Officials' numbers were down for the fall season but increased for the winter season;
- (2) the executive board meeting was held at the end of January 2012; and (3) the possibility of online officials registration.

General Action Items

Athletic Class and Open Gym: (Action Item), (Referendum Item) Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, presented a proposal to eliminate 7.4.4 (Athletic Class) and 7.4.5 (Open Gym) and replace them with "Seven hours of total contact time in a school week inclusive of athletic class, beginning in the 2012-2013 school year."

Currently the NMAA Bylaws allow students to participate in Athletic Classes and Open Gym as well as meeting for one hour a day with a coach to condition for out of season sports. A motion was made by Mr. Barreras to amend the proposal as presented from 7 hours to 7.5 hours of total contact time in a school week inclusive of athletic class. Mr. Sayre seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (15-0).

Adding a middle school representative to the NMAA Commission: (Action Item), (Referendum Item) Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, presented a proposal to consider adding a middle school representative to the NMAA Commission; creating a 16 member commission. The rationale is that middle schools currently do not have representation on the NMAA Commission. A motion was made by Ms. Nelms to amend the proposal to consider adding the chairperson of the middle school committee to the NMAA Commission. Mr. Durham seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (15-0).

Break 10:10 a.m. – 10:20 a.m.

General Discussion/Information Items

Update on 2011-2012 Board of Directors' Goals: Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, presented the updated Board of Directors' Goals for 2011-2012. She went over the academic achievement survey results, the PED letter to superintendents, and the NMAA Bylaw exceptions regarding scheduling and attendance in school.

Future Calendar Adjustments: Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, discussed potential changes to future NMAA calendars.

District Tournament Financial Reports & Membership dues: Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, discussed a potential increase in membership dues, while allowing districts to keep all revenue from the district tournaments.

Seeding and Selection Process: Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, discussed the consideration of using power rankings in place of the New Mexico High School Coaches Association Poll as one criteria for seeding and selection.

Mandating a two-week moratorium: Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, asked the commission for input regarding a mandated two-week moratorium.

Interschool competition / scrimmages being prohibited in the off-season: Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, discussed that this should not be taking place in the off season and is currently a violation of NMAA Bylaw 7.4.4.

Eliminating Bylaw 6.7: Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, indicated that there are numerous problems with boarding schools and students transferring from them. This item will be heard at the NMAA Board meeting on March 7, 2012 because it was previously passed by the Commission.

Private schools' potential to play up in a classification for the 2012-2013 and the 2013-2014 classification block: Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, discussed that the NMAA has approached several private schools and asked if they would consider moving up in classification, for a two year block (beginning with the 2012-2013 school year) in select sport programs.

Review 40 day enrollment numbers: Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, discussed the 2011 40-day enrollment counts.

Review Referenda Results: Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, reviewed the referenda results and discussed that starting in the 2012-2013 school year any eighth grader that plays at the high school level must sign a participation form and it must be sent to the NMAA office PRIOR TO PARTICIPATION.

Track & Field Jewelry rule: Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, discussed that the NMAA will abide by the NFHS rule book concerning jewelry.

Football: Increasing Class AA playoff teams from 8 to 12: Mr. Randy Adrian, NMAA Assistant Director, discussed revising Class 2A football state qualifying from 8 teams to 12 teams because there are now 24 teams participating in 2A football.

Football: Decreasing Class 3A playoff teams from 12 to 8 teams: Mr. Randy Adrian, NMAA Assistant Director, discussed revising Class 3A football state qualifying from 12 teams to 8 teams because 3A dropped from 22 football teams to 18 teams.

Football: Football Coaches Survey results: Mr. Randy Adrian, NMAA Assistant Director, reviewed the results of a football coaches survey; 78 schools responded to the survey.

Consider Adjournment

Mr. Johnson asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting at 11:38 p.m. A motion was made by Mr. Martin. Mr. Affentranger seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (15-0).



About The MaxPreps Rankings

The MaxPreps Freeman Rankings

(The Freeman Rankings will determine the teams selected for the MaxPreps Tournament of Champions.)

MaxPreps National and State Freeman Ratings are the result of our collection of enormous amounts of information from teams throughout the country and the application of a computer model developed by our associate Ned Freeman. The most important thing to understand about how the ratings system works is that it is 100% objective.

The size of the schools, their division, the league they're in, how good the school or league are historically, their geographic location, how well liked the school is, how good the league is in other sports do not matter and therefore, none of these factors are programmed into the system. Those subjective factors inevitably bias humans saddled with the daunting task of trying to figure out who the best teams in the nation, in a state, or a region really are?

Instead, Ned's system just takes into account the facts. Cold, hard, and unfeeling fact - but as accurate, objective and fair as possible.

How It Works!

(A brief explanation of the factors that affect the MaxPreps Rankings system...)

MaxPreps uses a computer program to determine team rank. We do not poll coaches, sportswriters, or fans. Nor does our staff make any judgments on the merits of any individual team. Prior season history, school size, and comments on message boards are not considered in the MaxPreps

The system utilizes the huge number of game results stored in the MaxPreps database. Generally, the more a team wins the higher the ranking, but the system takes into account quality wins (against other highly ranked opponents) and strength of schedule.

For example, a team's ranking is hurt more by losing to a team that is ranked below them verses a team ranked ahead.

Other factors that will affect the rankings are times when MaxPreps has incomplete or inaccurate information. We will correct errors when they are reported to us. If we are missing a score, report it to us on the team's MaxPreps page. If we are missing a game on the schedule, send us a correction request.

Generally, the more games that are played the more accurate the rankings, so if a team that you perceive as being very strong has played substantially fewer games than other ranked teams it may reflect the fact that we have less data to work with.

Playoff games are weighed 2.1 times what a regular season game is.

Movement indicates the up or down movement within the rankings when compared to our previously published rankings.

MaxPreps football rankings are updated once a week, other sports will be updated three times a week during the sport season.

Note: A team must have played three games before they will appear in the rankings.

To assist our schools in evaluating sport participation that is equivalent to or on a higher level than our scholastic sport program the following guidelines are offered. The elements listed can be used to judge a foreign students' previous experience in a specific sport.

- The athletic contests are formal and cannot be considered "pick up" games.
- Competition is organized and scheduled between teams/individuals.
- Recognized rules are followed.
- Scores are kept.
- Equipment/facilities/uniforms are provided by a sponsor (club, school, town, agency).
- Competitions are officiated.
- Competition schedules and scores are publicized.
- Competitions are against a variety of opponents organized in a similar manner (clubs, towns, regions, nations).
- Individuals are selected through try-out sessions and/or past performance.

REMINDER:

All foreign students who have been graduated from the secondary school system in their country are ineligible for our interschool athletic program. Please refer to NYSPHSAA Handbook, pages 95 & 96 for further information.

HEAT ILLNESS PROTCOL

Proposal: Consider adding the following Heat Illness Prevention protocol for all outdoor sports, to NMAA Bylaws (Section VII).
"The athletic trainer and the head coach of each sport and level is responsible for checking the heat index prior to the beginning of practice (www.nmact.org). Go to website and enter your zip code and the site will calculate the heat index for current time and for projected high temperature.
Heat index above 104, practice is cancelled (the athletic trainer has the authority to cancel practice). Practice may occur later in the day provided the heat index falls to 104 or less. Heat index 100-104, consider modification to remove protective equipment and to shorten practice. Heat index 95-99, use caution, but may practice. Heat index under 95, risk of heat illness is present, but risk is greatly reduced. Water breaks should occur every 20-30 minutes. Do NOT restrict intake of fluids.
Emersion in cold water is treatment of choice for management of acute heat exhaustion and heat stroke. Call EMS if you suspect heat illness."
Rationale: Heat illness has the potential to impact all outdoor sports. Prevention protocol will help to ensure that all outdoor athletes are participating under safe "heat related" guidelines.
Budget Impact: None.
Notes: "Heat Illness" means a serious medical condition resulting from the body's inability to cope with a

particular heat load, and includes heat cramps, heat exhaustion, heat syncope and heat stroke.

abide by in an effort to ensure a safe environment for student-athletes and a level playing field for all
teams.

March 13, 2012 (HealthDay News) -- Heat-related deaths among high school and college football players in the United States nearly tripled between 1994 and 2009, according to a new study.

An average of nearly three players died each year during that time period -- up from about one death per year during the previous 15 years -- with six deaths occurring in Georgia alone, the most of any state.

The University of Georgia researchers analyzed weather conditions, along with information on all 58 athletes who died of hyperthermia (overheating) during football practice. Specifically, they examined the temperature, humidity and time of day of the incident, as well as the players' height, weight and position.

The study, published recently in the International Journal of Biometeorology, found that morning heat indexes were higher from 1994 to 2009 than they were in the preceding 15 years.

Athletic Safety NMAA PRESEASON PRACTICE REGULATIONS FOR FOOTBALL SCHOOLS THAT BEGIN PRACTICE PRIOR TO THE SCHOOL YEAR ARE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. Practice may begin on Monday, week #6 of the NMAA calendar for football. All other fall sports begin on Monday, week #7.
- 2. Each team or individual must have at least ten (10) days of practice before competing in a game. For football, the first game may be played beginning week #9 of the NMAA calendar.
- 3. Multiple on field practice sessions on consecutive days will not be permitted unless the second practice on the second day consists of only a teaching period/walkthrough practice ONLY with no conditioning or weights. There shall be NO contact activities/equipments permitted (including helmets).
- 4. On days when teams conduct one (1) practice, student-athletes will not engage in more than three (3) hours of on-field practice time. * Coaches must use this same guideline (#4) for in-season practices as well.
- 5. On days when teams conduct more than one practice, student-athletes shall not engage in more than five hours of on field practice activities with the length of a single practice limited to three hours.
- 6. On days that teams conduct multiple practice sessions, student-athletes must be provided with at least two (2) hours of recovery time between the end of the first practice period and the start of the last practice period. During the two hour recovery time, student-athletes may not engage in any other physical activities (e.g. conditioning, weights, 7 on 7).
- 7. All practices must allow for water breaks and general acclimatization to hot and/or humid weather throughout the season.
- 8. The first four (4) days, excluding Sunday, of practice for each student-athlete shall be an acclimatization period. Helmets only are the only piece of protective equipment that may be worn during the first three (3) days. Helmet and shoulder pads may be worn beginning on day four (4). Full pad practices may begin on day five (5).



Proposal: In accordance with NFHS rule 1-2-3I (Corporate Logos on field) consider allowing schools to only place corporate logos in the end zone or outside the field of play, so as not to restrict/ interrupt the field markings.
Rationale: Although the NFHS has approved corporate logos on the field of play, NMAA staff has concerns with logos interrupting field markings.
Budget Impact: None.
Notes: The NFHS Football Rules Committee has approved state associations and their member schools to place corporate advertising and/or commercial markings on the field of play. These types of markings previously were only allowed in the end zones and outside the field.
Rule 1-2-3l states that while corporate advertising and/or commercial markings will be allowed, the markings may not obstruct the yard lines, hash marks or nine-yard marks.
Recommendation: NMAA Staff supports this proposal.

Proposal:

Consider renewing the baseball wood/ composite wood bat regulation.

Rationale:

During the 2012 baseball season, wood/composite wood bats were used at all high school levels. In April, a survey was sent to all head baseball coaches regarding this change and how it has affected the sport. Of the 65 coaches who voted, 86% felt that the use of wood bats was positive for the state. 77% also voted to keep these regulations in effect for the 2013 season. The majority of coaches do feel that wood bats have changed the game for the better, putting more importance on defense, pitching, and the basic fundamentals of baseball. Many feel that the main focus had been hitting, especially home runs and relying on your offense to win games.

Budget Impact:

The economic impact of moving to wood bats was unknown prior to this season. Many felt that too many bats would be broken, thus causing schools/players to spend more money than years past when a metal bat would last an entire year. Part of the survey sent to coaches was regarding economic impact. 46% felt that using wood/composite wood was actually less costly than using metal bats, while 31% felt there was no significant change, and only 23% felt it was more costly to use wood than metal. In talking to many people around the state, using composite wood bats can be a huge help with cost. The schools/players who have broken the most bats and spent more funding on replacing these are mostly those who use traditional wood bats instead of composites, which break much easier.

NMAA Staff Recommendation:

Based on the survey of coaches and recommendation to continue with the current wood bat regulations by the Baseball Sports Specific Committee, the NMAA staff is in favor of this proposal.

Rationale:

Prior to the 2010-2011 season, the match limitations for Wrestling were changed from 14 Meets to a point system. 32 points are now given to each varsity program (28 for sub-varsity) and each meet counts as a certain number of points based on the format of the event. This change was made during a time where the membership had been looking to cut game limitations in all sports due to the economy. Although no other sport ended up cutting games, Wrestling still went forward with this new format, and the result has been that matches have been cut by about 12%. Because no other sports have since been cut, the Wrestling Sports Specific Committee is asking that schools re-gain these lost matches and would like to increase the points allowed at both the varsity and sub-varsity levels for the 2013-2014 school year.

Budget Impact:

Schools would be affected economically if this proposal was passed. More points allowed means more events and this will increase costs for each program should they take advantage of increased match limitations. (higher costs for travel, officials, event workers, etc.)

NMAA Staff Recommendation:

Due to the additional expenses that will be incurred with an increase in match limitations, the NMAA Staff is not in favor of the proposal at this time.

May 2012 Commission Meeting: Proposal to Increase Match Limitations for Wrestling

NMAA Handbook – Section 7

7.24.1 General Rules/Policies:

D. Match/Meet Limitation - Each varsity team/individual is limited to thirty-two (32) competition points prior to the district tournament. Each sub-varsity team/individual is limited to 28 competition points prior to the district tournament. Competition points are as follows: Dual Meet - 1 point, Double Dual/Triangular - 2 points, Quad/One Day Tournament - 3 points, Two Day Tournament with Single or Double Elimination - 4 points, Two Day Multi-School Event with No/Limited Elimination - 6 points.

NOTE: For Individuals' limits, all events, sub – varsity (including MS/JH) and varsity count towards an individual's event limits. When the total number of competition points at all levels reaches 28, the individual is no longer eligible for sub-varsity competition. When the total number of competition points reaches 32, the individual is no longer eligible for further regular season varsity competition.

The WSSC would like to increase match limitations from 32 to 36 for Varsity programs and from 28 to 32 for Sub-Varsity programs.

Adjustment to Class 4A qualifying numbers for the 2013 State Wrestling tournament (due to changes in alignment/classification).

Rationale:

With the changes in alignment and classification for second half of the current four year block, Class 4A Wrestling will lose two schools (one to 5A and one to 3A). District 1 will lose Bloomfield HS, while District 5 will lose Atrisco Heritage Academy. This will take both of these districts from five teams to four teams. In 2012, these five team districts qualified four wrestlers into the State Tournament. With the drop to four teams in these districts, qualifiers must in turn drop to three wrestlers to stay in line with what is done in other four team districts. It should also be noted that although Class 5A and 3A are gaining a school, this takes the districts receiving a new team from five to six, and thus would not affect qualifying numbers. Centennial HS will also be added to Class 4A, but will be added to District 3/4which also takes them from five to six teams (no affect on qualifiers).

Budget Impact:

School budgets will not be impacted. The NMAA budget will be impacted slightly as two less qualifiers will mean less attendance and lower gate receipts.

NMAA Staff Recommendation:

The NMAA Staff is in favor of this proposal.

Proposal: Consider increasing volleyball assignors' fees due to an increase in regular season tournaments. The increase would be as follows:
 8-Team Tournament, Pool Play, Single Elimination Bracket = \$75.00 per tournament 8-Team Tournament, Pool Play, Double Elimination Bracket = \$112.50 per tournament 16-Team Tournament, Pool Play, Double Elimination Bracket = \$225.00 per tournament
 The format in #1 above offers an additional 19 matches to the schedule, 12 pool play and seven bracket matches. This is equivalent to an additional two to three total seasons for any given school to schedule. The format in #2 above offers and additional 24 matches to the schedule, 12 pool play and 12 bracket matches. This is equivalent to and additional three seasons for any given school to schedule. The format in #3 above offers an additional 54 matches to schedule, 16 pool play and 30 bracket matches. This is equivalent to an additional six to seven total seasons for any given school to schedule.
Budget Impact: This proposal would impact the budget of any school hosting a tournament during the regular season and would vary based on bracket format (anywhere from \$75 to \$225 per tournament paid by the host school).

BASKETBALL REGIONAL ASSIGNORS

Proposal: Reconsider a proposal which would allow basketball varsity regional assignors to assign all invitational basketball tournaments. (<i>This item was previously presented to and passed the Commission but was taken off the Board agenda in 2010</i>).
Rationale: As part of the proposal, the assignor would be bound by any requests by the host school concerning selection of officials, fees or any other tradition associated with that particular tournament. In other words, there would be no changes for the schools in the process. The rationale is that certain officials, including group leaders, have convinced schools it is there job to take care of the assignments and charge the schools for those assignments. It creates a "quid pro quo" situation between assigning individuals to assign each other to the tournaments they control.
Budget Impact: This proposal could possibly positively impact schools by saving them money for not having to pay an assignor to take care of the assignments since the varsity regional assignor is paid through membership dues to cover all varsity contests.
Notes: None.
NMAA Staff Recommendation: NMAA Staff will support the Commission's decision.

7.4 OUT-OF-SEASON COACHING DURING THE SCHOOL YEAR

A Coaching Staff is allowed 7.5 hours of total contact time per week (during days when school is in session only) to work with prospective student athletes during the off-season. Sports specific and sports specific conditioning classes are to be included within this allowable timeframe. This provision applies to all school coaches, paid and volunteer. This rule prohibits coaching these individuals on any team (school or non-school sponsored) out-of-season during the school year.

7.4.1 Athletic Class and Open Gym/Field

- **A.** During the school year, but outside a particular sport season (out-of-season), a member school may allow participation in that particular sport during an athletic period.
- **B.** Open Gym/Field is to be included within the allowable 7.5 hours per week of contact time during the off-season.
 - Q1: Our school is on a 4 x 4 block schedule which has an athletic class that meets for 1.5 hours per day. Do I get any time to work with my athletes after school?
 - A1: No. The athletic class consumes the allowable out of season contact time; therefore you are afforded no further contact with your athletes after school.
 - Q2: Does the 7.5 hours per week allowed during the off-season include "open gym/field?"
 - A2: The 7.5 hours per week allowed during the off-season includes "open gym/field." Having the gym/field opened by parents, volunteer coaches, and/or staff members is not permissible unless you count it within the 7.5 hours of allowable contact time.
 - Q3 School is not in session on President's Day. Do I then have 7.5 hours of contact time with my athletes, including athletic class, the rest of the week during school days?
 - A3: Yes. Contact with your athletes is not allowed on days when school is not in session; however, you may have contact with your athletes for a total of 7.5 hours for the remainder of the week.
 - Q4: I would like to have "open gym/field" on Saturday. Is it permissible?
 - A4: No. During the off-season, you may only have contact with your athletes on Monday thru Friday and only on the days when school is in session. On Saturday, you cannot have "open gym/field" for your athletes even if someone other than a member of your coaching staff is organizing it.
 - Q5: Our school does not offer an athletic class. May I use the allowable 7.5 hours in different increments or must I practice a maximum of 1.5 hours each day, Monday thru Friday?
 - A5: You can use the 7.5 hours in various increments; for example, working with your athletes for 2.5 hrs. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday only.

- Q6: We have an athletic class that meets for 1 hour per day. I understand that I have 2.5 more contact hours during the week with my athletes. For the freshmen that are not in class, do I still have 7.5 hours a week with them?
- A6: No. The 7.5 hours is inclusive. Therefore, a coach does not distinguish between who is in athletic class and who is not to determine his/her 7.5 hours of contact time per week.
- Q7: During the off-season, can a baseball coach work on his sport with the football players who also play baseball for 7.5 hours per week if they have already been with the football coach for 7.5 hours?
- A7: It is up to the school as to how they want to share athletes. Coaches from each sport have 7.5 hours per week for their program, all inclusive.
- Q8: If I have utilized my 7.5 hours of weekly off-season contact time with my athletes, can they have extra time to work with one of my junior high coaches?
- A8: No, the 7.5 hours of contact time includes time spent with any member of your coaching staff, inclusive of volunteer coaches.
- Q9: I am the head baseball coach at my school and also own and operate a baseball academy in our community. If members of my team(s) wish to come to my business and pay to take batting practice from me during the off-season, does this count against their contact time with me?
- A9: Yes. You have a maximum of 7.5 hours of contact time per week with your athletes during the off-season to work on their skill development for your sport.
- Q10: Can a coach in my program (grades 7 thru 12) coach a club team (American Legion, AAU, etc.) consisting of athletes from my program?
- A10: No. Coaches (head, assistant, and volunteer) involved with your program cannot coach a club team consisting of your sport's athletes during the offseason. They may however, coach club teams during the summer since the NMAA does not regulate summer activity.
- Q11: Can I work with my athletes (within the 7.5 hours allowable contact time) on a snow day?
- A11: No. During the off-season, you may work with your athletes only on days when school is in session.
- Q12: May I supervise a "junior league" club program during the off-season?
- A12: You may supervise a "junior league" club program for student athletes grades 6 and below at your discretion. Working with student athletes grades 7 and above, in any format, will count against your 7.5 hours of allowable contact time per week.

- Q13: We have an athletic class for our varsity and jv. football players which meets for one hour daily during our school's seventh period. Our freshman coaches also have an athletic class for the members of our freshman football team which meets for an hour during the first period of the school day. Are we in violation of the 7.5 hours of contact time during the offseason?
- A13: Yes you are. A program's coaches, be it head, assistant and/or volunteer, for teams from grades 7 thru varsity, have a total of 7.5 hours of contact time weekly with the program's athletes during the off-season.
- Q14: I am a football coach and teach a sport specific weight training class in which only football players are enrolled. Does this count against my 7.5 hours of allowable contact time during the off-season?
- A14: If the class is specific to athletes of the sport that you coach, it DOES count against your allowable contact time. In order for it not to count against your allowable contact time, the class must be open to and include, an equitable percentage of all students within your school.

Athletic Class and Open Gym Bylaws

Questions and Answers Regarding this Bylaw

Q1: Our school is on a 4X4 block schedule which has an athletic class that meets for 1.5 hours per day. Do I get any time to work with my athletes after school?

A1: No. The athletic class consumes the allowable out of season practice time; therefore you are afforded no further contact with your athletes after school.

Q2: Does the 7.5 hours per week allowed during the off season include "open gym"?

A2: The 7.5 hours per week allowed during the off-season includes "open gym." Having the gym opened by parents, volunteer coaches, and/or staff members is not permissible unless you count it within the 7.5 hours of allowable contact time.

Q3: School is not in session on President's Day. Do I then have 7.5 hours, including athletic class, the rest of the week during school days?

A3: Yes. Contact with your athletes is not allowed on days when school is not in session; however, you may work with your athletes for a total of 7.5 hours for the remainder of the week.

Q4: I would like to have "open gym" on Saturday. Is that permissible?

A4: No. You may only have contact with your athletes on Monday thru Friday and only on the days when school is in session. On Saturday, you cannot have "open gym" for your athletes even if someone other than a member of your coaching staff is organizing it.

Q5: We do not have an athletic class. Can I use the allowable 7.5 hours in different increments or must I practice a minimum of one hour each day, Monday thru Friday?

A5: You can use the 7.5 hours in various increments; for example, working with your athletes for 2 hrs. and 30 min. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday only.

Q6: I have an athletic class that meets for 1 hour per day. I understand that I have 2.5 more contact hours during the week with my athletes. For the freshmen that are not in class, do I still have 7.5 hours a week with them?

A6: No. The 7.5 hours is all inclusive. Therefore, a coach does not distinguish between who is in athletic class and who is not to determine his/her 7.5 hours per week.

Q7: Can a baseball coach work with the football players for 7.5 hours a week if they have already been with the football coach 7.5 hours?

A7: It is up to the school as to how they want to share athletes. A coach has 7.5 hours per week for their program, all inclusive.

Q8: If I have utilized my 7.5 hours of contact time with my athletes during the off season, can they have extra time to work with one of my junior high coaches?

A8: No. The 7.5 hours of contact time includes time spent with any member of your coaching staff, inclusive of volunteer coaches.

Q9: I am the head baseball coach at my school and also own and operate a baseball academy in our community. If members of my team(s) wish to come to my business and pay to take batting practice from me during the off season, does this count against their contact time with me?

A9: Yes. You have a maximum of 7.5 hours of contact time per week with your athletes during the off season to work on their skill development for your sport.

Q10: Can a coach in your program (grades 7 thru 12) coach a club (American Legion, AAU, etc.) team consisting of athletes from his/her program?

A10: No. Coaches (head, assistant, and volunteer) involved with your program cannot coach a club team consisting of his/her athletes during the off season during the school year. They may however, coach club teams during the summer.

Q11: Can I work with my athletes (within the 7.5 hours allowable contact time) on a snow day?

A11: No. During the off season you may work with your athletes only on days when school is in session.

Q12: Can I supervise a "junior league" club program during the off-season?

A12: You may supervise a junior club program for student athletes grades 6 and below at your discretion. Working with student athletes grades 7 and above in any format will count against your 7.5 allowable hours per week.
