NMAA Board of Directors Meeting March 7, 2012 7:30 A.M. The Pit-Letterman's Lounge

Welcome – Meeting called to order by Mr. Mike Phipps, NMAA Board of Directors President, at 7:32 a.m. A roll call was conducted by Mrs. Mindy Ioane, NMAA Administrative Assistant, and the following members were present.

Thirteen members present representing a quorum.

Approval of Agenda:

Mr. Phipps asked for a motion to approve the agenda. Mr. Little made the motion to approve the agenda with the following changes:

- 1. Move item VII. Elect NMAA Board President to replace the retiring Mike Phipps as of April 13, 2012, directly after III. NMAA Executive Director's Report.
- 2. Remove General Action Item: Consider Volcano Vista's State Swimming & Diving sanction of \$500 for not abiding by State entry deadlines.
- 3. Move General Action Item: Consider a waiver to the 180-day transfer rule for Las Cruces Public Schools for one school year (2012-2013) to the first action item.

Mrs. Ryan seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (13-0).

Approval of Minutes:

Mr. Phipps asked for a motion to approve the minutes of the February 29, 2012 meeting. Mrs. Parsons made the motion to approve the minutes as presented. Mr. Rounds seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (13-0).

Executive Session:

Mr. Phipps stated that an Executive Session was not needed at this time.

Executive Director's Report:

Mr. Gary Tripp, NMAA Executive Director, discussed five items during his report: (1) He welcomed T.J. Parks, Superintendent of Hobbs Municipal Schools, to the Board of Directors, as he was elected to fill the remainder of Area B, Large School's term in place of retiring Mr. Mike Phipps; (2) discussed the cost of parking during the State Championships that is being charged by UNM; (3) House Bill 2; \$50,000 line item appropriated for the New Mexico Activities Association that would support new Activities at the Middle and High School levels was vetoed by Governor Susana Martinez; (4) Mr. Tripp discussed the Foundation Board of Directors Meeting that was held on March 6, 2012; and (5) he asked that the Board consider allowing NMAA member schools an extra basketball game a season, with proceeds to benefit the NMAA Foundation and to consider a portion of violation fines/sanctions be distributed to the NMAA Foundation.

Elect NMAA Board President to replace the retiring Mike Phipps as of April 13, 2012:

Mr. Phipps asked for nominations from the Board of Directors to serve the remainder of his term as the NMAA Board of Directors President. The term will begin on April 13, 2012 and will expire June 2013. Mr. Brooks submitted a nomination for Mrs. Ryan (Large Area A), while Mr. Pool submitted a nomination for Mr. Green (Small Area C). The official election ballot was prepared by Mr. Robert Zayas, NMAA Associate Director, and was distributed following the Financial Report.

Financial Report:

Ms. Sally Marquez, Assistant Executive Director, presented the NMAA Financial Reports which included: (1) the 2011- 2012 Ticket Sales report and (2) the 2011- 2012 Financial reports for Fall Sports, as of February 14, 2012.

Mr. Robert Zayas, NMAA Associate Director, and Mr. Dusty Young, NMAA Assistant Director of Marketing, distributed and collected the official President election ballots from the Board of Directors to tally the results.

General Action Items:

Consider a waiver to the 180-day transfer rule for Las Cruces Public Schools for one school year (2012-2013): (Action Item) Mr. Stan Rounds, Las Cruces Public Schools Superintendent, asked the Board to consider a one-year waiver of the 180-day transfer rule for current Las Cruces Public School students for the 2012-2013 school year for students to attend Centennial High School. Mrs. Ryan made the motion to approve the request as presented. Mr. Johnson seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (13-0).

Consider eliminating Bylaw 6.7 (Boarding School Students) beginning with the 2012-2013 school year: (Action Item) (Referendum Item) Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, asked the Board to consider a proposal to eliminate Bylaw

6.7 (Boarding School Students) beginning in 2012-2013, where Boarding School students would be treated in the same manner as all other students.

Mr. Lindsey Gilbert, Head of Menaul Schools, presented and discussed Foreign/Boarding School Student Rule concerns.

Mr. Mike Tillman, Athletic Director, Navajo Prep High School discussed his concerns with NMAA Bylaw 6.7.

A motion was made by Mr. Little to accept the request as presented, as a referendum item. Mr. Pool seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (13-0).

Consider revising Athletic Class and Open Gym bylaws to read, "Seven and one half hours of total contact time in a school week, inclusive of sports specific and sports specific condition classes beginning with the 2012-2013 school year." (Action Item) (Referendum Item) presented by Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director. Mr. Benoit made a motion to accept the proposal as presented as a referendum item. Mr. Pool seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed (12-1).

Mr. Phipps announced that Mrs. Janel Ryan had been officially elected to the position of NMAA Board of Directors President.

Consider the revision of NMAA financial policies and procedures for volleyball, football and basketball and a 7% increase in NMAA membership dues to begin with the 2012-2013 school year: (Action Item) Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, presented PowerPoint slides displaying district tournament financial reports and membership dues. Mr. Rounds made the motion to allow member schools to keep all volleyball and basketball district tournament revenue, eliminate the travel reimbursement in football and increase membership dues by 10% with an allowance for individual schools to apply for a waiver as needed. Mr. Pool seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (13-0).

Mr. Green had to leave the meeting.

Consider alternative Class B Districts for the 2012-2013, 2013-2104 school years: (Action Item) Dr. Chuck Harrison, Maxwell Schools Superintendent, asked the Board to approve the division of Class B, District 1 into two separate districts for the 2012-2013 and the 2013-2014 school years. District 1 will include Wagon Mound, Des Moines, Maxwell, Roy/Mosquero and the newly formed District 5 will be Temple Baptist, Evangel Christian, Victory Christian, Santa Fe Waldorf, NMSD and Walatowa. Mr. Casados made the motion to accept the proposal as presented. Mr. Sandoval seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (12-0).

Consider dividing District 1-2A into two four team districts for the 2012-2013, 2013-2014 school years: (Action Item) Mr. Mike Tillman, Athletic Director, Navajo Prep, presented the proposal. Mr. Rounds made the motion to table the proposal until NMAA

staff has an opportunity to present a formal realignment proposal to the Board in June 2012. Mrs. Ryan seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (12-0).

Mr. Phipps asked the Board to elect a Vice-President of the NMAA Board of Directors to fill Mrs. Ryan's term that will expire June 2013. Mr. Phipps recommended Mr. Green for the position. Mr. Rounds made the motion to formally nominate Mr. Green. Mrs. Ryan seconded the nomination. Mr. Little made the motion to elect Mr. Green to fill the position of Vice-President for the NMAA Board of Directors. Mr. Casados seconded the motion. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (12-0).

Mr. Gary Tripp, NMAA Executive Director presented Mr. Phipps with a plaque and thanked him for his service as the NMAA Board of Directors President.

Seeding and Selection Process – Consideration of Power Ratings in place of the New Mexico High School Coaches Association Poll as one criteria: Ms. Sally Marquez, NMAA Assistant Executive Director, provided the Board information on The Freeze Ratings and MaxPreps Rankings. Mr. Rounds left the meeting at 9:09 a.m.

Review 40-Day enrollment numbers: Mr. Robert Zayas, NMAA Associate Director, provided the 2011 40-Day enrollment numbers to the Board of Directors.

Review Referenda Results (January 19, 2012): Mr. Robert Zayas, NMAA Associate Director, presented the referenda results of the "8th grade participation form"- 60 in favor, 30 do not favor.

Review estimates for Hall of Pride and Honor updates: Mr. Robert Zayas, NMAA Associate Director, provided two estimates for additional lighting, as well as two estimates for a microphone system for the Hall of Pride and Honor.

Consider Adjournment:

Mr. Phipps asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting at 9:22 a.m. A motion was made by Mr. Benoit. The motion was seconded by Mr. Brooks. A vote was taken and passed unanimously (12-0).

About The MaxPreps Rankings

The MaxPreps Freeman Rankings

(The Freeman Rankings will determine the teams selected for the MaxPreps Tournament of Champions.)

MaxPreps National and State Freeman Ratings are the result of our collection of enormous amounts of information from teams throughout the country and the application of a computer model developed by our associate Ned Freeman. The most important thing to understand about how the ratings system works is that it is 100% objective.

The size of the schools, their division, the league they're in, how good the school or league are historically, their geographic location, how well liked the school is, how good the league is in other sports do not matter and therefore, none of these factors are programmed into the system. Those subjective factors inevitably bias humans saddled with the daunting task of trying to figure out who the best teams in the nation, in a state, or a region really are?

Instead, Ned's system just takes into account the facts. Cold, hard, and unfeeling fact - but as accurate, objective and fair as possible.

How It Works!

(A brief explanation of the factors that affect the MaxPreps Rankings system...)

MaxPreps uses a computer program to determine team rank. We do not poll coaches, sportswriters, or fans. Nor does our staff make any judgments on the merits of any individual team. Prior season history, school size, and comments on message boards are not considered in the MaxPreps

The system utilizes the huge number of game results stored in the MaxPreps database. Generally, the more a team wins the higher the ranking, but the system takes into account quality wins (against other highly ranked opponents) and strength of schedule.

For example, a team's ranking is hurt more by losing to a team that is ranked below them verses a team ranked ahead.

Other factors that will affect the rankings are times when MaxPreps has incomplete or inaccurate information. We will correct errors when they are reported to us. If we are missing a score, report it to us on the team's MaxPreps page. If we are missing a game on the schedule, send us a <u>correction request</u>.

Generally, the more games that are played the more accurate the rankings, so if a team that you perceive as being very strong has played substantially fewer games than other ranked teams it may reflect the fact that we have less data to work with.

Playoff games are weighed 2.1 times what a regular season game is.

Movement indicates the up or down movement within the rankings when compared to our previously published rankings.

MaxPreps football rankings are updated once a week, other sports will be updated three times a week during the sport season.

Note: A team must have played three games before they will appear in the rankings.

- Competition schedules and scores are publicized.
- Competitions are against a variety of opponents organized in a similar manner (clubs, towns, regions, nations).
- Individuals are selected through try-out sessions and/or past performance.

REMINDER:

HEAT ILLNESS PROTOCOL

Proposal:
Consider adding the following Heat Illness Prevention protocol for all outdoor sports, to NMAA Bylaws (Section VII).
"The athletic trainer and the head coach of each sport and level is responsible for checking the heat index prior to the beginning of practice (www.nmact.org). Go to website and enter your zip code and the site will calculate the heat index for current time and for projected high temperature.
Heat index above 104, practice is cancelled (the athletic trainer has the authority to cancel practice). Practice may occur later in the day provided the heat index falls to 104 or less. Heat index 100-104, consider modification to remove protective equipment and to shorten practice. Heat index 95-99, use caution, but may practice. Heat index under 95, risk of heat illness is present, but risk is greatly reduced. Water breaks should occur every 20-30 minutes. Do NOT restrict intake of fluids.
Emersion in cold water is treatment of choice for management of acute heat exhaustion and heat stroke. Call EMS if you suspect heat illness."
Rationale: Heat illness has the potential to impact all outdoor sports. Prevention protocol will help to ensure that all outdoor athletes are participating under safe "heat related" guidelines.
Budget Impact: None.
Notes: " <i>Heat Illness</i> " means a serious medical condition resulting from the body's inability to cope with a

particular heat load, and includes heat cramps, heat exhaustion, heat syncope and heat stroke.

Proposal:

Adjustment to Class 4A qualifying numbers for the 2013 State Wrestling tournament (due to changes in alignment/classification).

Rationale:

With the changes in alignment and classification for second half of the current four year block, Class 4A Wrestling will lose two schools (one to 5A and one to 3A). District 1 will lose Bloomfield HS, while District 5 will lose Atrisco Heritage Academy. This will take both of these districts from five teams to four teams. In 2012, these five team districts qualified four wrestlers into the State Tournament. With the drop to four teams in these districts, qualifiers must in turn drop to three wrestlers to stay in line with what is done in other four team districts. It should also be noted that although Class 5A and 3A are gaining a school, this takes the districts receiving a new team from five to six, and thus would not affect qualifying numbers. Centennial HS will also be added to Class 4A, but will be added to District 3/4which also takes them from five to six teams (no affect on qualifiers).

Budget Impact:

School budgets will not be impacted. The NMAA budget will be impacted slightly as two less qualifiers will mean less attendance and lower gate receipts.

Proposal:

Consider renewing the baseball wood/ composite wood bat regulation for a four year period.

Rationale:

During the 2012 baseball season, wood/composite wood bats were used at all high school levels. In April, a survey was sent to all head baseball coaches regarding this change and how it has affected the sport. Of the 65 coaches who voted, 86% felt that the use of wood bats was positive for the state. 77% also voted to keep these regulations in effect for the 2013 season. The majority of coaches do feel that wood bats have changed the game for the better, putting more importance on defense, pitching, and the basic fundamentals of baseball. Many feel that the main focus had been hitting, especially home runs and relying on your offense to win games.

Budget Impact:

The economic impact of moving to wood bats was unknown prior to this season. Many felt that too many bats would be broken, thus causing schools/players to spend more money than years past when a metal bat would last an entire year. Part of the survey sent to coaches was regarding economic impact. 46% felt that using wood/composite wood was actually less costly than using metal bats, while 31% felt there was no significant change, and only 23% felt it was more costly to use wood than metal. In talking to many people around the state, using composite wood bats can be a huge help with cost. The schools/players who have broken the most bats and spent more funding on replacing these are mostly those who use traditional wood bats instead of composites, which break much easier.

NMAA Commission Recommendation:

The NMAA Commission supports this proposal.

NMAA Staff Recommendation:

Based on the survey of coaches and recommendation to continue with the current wood bat regulations by the Baseball Sports Specific Committee, the NMAA staff supports this proposal.

Proposal: Consider a revision to the volleyball pool play officials' fee schedule, raising the fee from \$15.00 per pool play match to \$22.50 per pool play match.

Rationale:

The reason this is being proposed is that we are currently in a district with 9 teams, the largest in AA. We have had to travel to Estancia (135 miles one way) in 2011 and again to Laguna 3 times in the last 5 years for the District competition and would like to cut down on travel expenses and schedule considerations. In 2010 we had to stay overnight in Laguna because of the 2 day format and it cost over an additional \$ 1000. We schedule 8 meets instead of the usual 10. It is not geographically suitable for us especially when you consider that Magdalena (184 miles one way) is also in the district. Traditionally, we were in identical district as the current 2AA (which has only 3 teams) when we were last in AA back in 1994. All the schools are close in proximity with none being more than 100 miles. The schools in District 2AA compete in the same meets as we do, are competitively equitable and we would like to reestablish that tradition because it is geographically more sensible and fiscally more responsible. At least 2 schools will host meets that will cut down on travel distance and the reciprocation of meet fees. Moreover, we never do get chosen to host a district meet and haven't hosted one for over 12 years.

Budget Impact:

It costs \$ 22 per student to attend an athletic competition. That includes gas, driver expenses and meal. For the sake of fairness we will take out the meals and say \$15 a student with an average trip of 200 miles or \$ 300- \$ 400 dollars a meet which is on the conservative side. Over the course of a season this is significant. The price of diesel fuel is high at this point (\$ 4.10 per gallon) and this is a clear example of a budget impact. In addition the longer the trip the more meal costs increase. An additional meal on a longer trip is over \$ 200 a meet. What the school doesn't pick up is passed on to the students and parents.

Notes:

Left out of all this is time away from school. While we do realize that there are guidelines, early departures from school for track are equal to about 3-5 days a year. With more and more schools hosting weekday meets and with some meets already closed to non-traditional schools, the option is to attend a 3-4A meet or travel further. When you travel further you spend more and miss more class.

Budget Impact:

Budget is a major concern for any athletic activity. Mileage, meals, bus driver, bus costs—all of these play a vital role in the affordability of travel and competition. The impact on our Class B schools will be directly proportional to the impact of any other school in any other Classification. Money is tight but there is a camaraderie among Class B schools and coaches that will find ways to cut costs such as cooking out for the visiting team or allowing the visiting team to spend the night in the host school's gym.

Notes:

District 1B and District 5B are in total agreement with this proposal. We feel community pride and school morale trump the cost of one or two more games.

For two years, let Class B compete 16 teams like the rest of the Classifications do. The #1 seed playing the #16 seed makes no more difference to the Class B school than it does to the Class AAAAA school. Travel and cost is already a factor in the other 5 Classifications. Let Class B deal with the funding factors.

As far as the discrepancy of the scores in the first round, a person does not have to do much research in the 2012 first rounds to see that the score discrepancies were great. The argument that the #1 seed does not want to waste its time in playing the #16 seed is not a good argument. All brackets in all Classifications (and in other sport competitions, ie NCAA 64 teams!) seed a much higher school with a much

lower school in the first round. If this did not happen, then there would be a possibility of a #1 seed meeting a #2 seed in a first or second round. Brackets are made so that the "expected better team" has an advantage. Class B is ready to meet this challenge.

Surely, if Class AAA only has 19 schools and they get to qualify 16 teams to the State Tournament, NMAA can allow Class B a similar privilege. When a higher classified school wins 7 games and qualifies for State and our teams win 13 or 14 games and have to stay home, THAT'S when bias and discrimination enter into the arena. We are merely seeking what is fair and equal.
